CULTIVATING MASDEVALLIAS IN HOT SUMMER REGIONS

Riccardo Motterle, a research chemist for a fine chemicals and pharmaceuticals company, began growing orchids at the age of 12. He now raises tropical orchids, as well as terrestrial species from Australia and Europe. His special interest is in rescuing native orchids from construction sites, and he now manages several hundred rescued plants. Dr. Motterle lives with his wife and son in the countryside near Vicenza, a small town about 70 km from Venice, Italy.

Masdevallias and related genera are very desirable orchids, not just for the particular form of their flowers, but also for their wide range of colors. Moreover, Masdevallias are generally very small plants; with greenhouse space often at a premium, an enthusiast can grow a collection of many different species and hybrids within a small space. Unfortunately, amateur growers can find it difficult to successfully maintain these plants during the hot summer months. Masdevallias are native to the humid mountain regions of South and Central America, where they normally experience quite cool and humid conditions. If you are fortunate to live in a location with cool, humid conditions, or if you have a greenhouse cooler, you will have no problem. On the other hand, if you live in an area with hot summers and without a cooler in your greenhouse, you may watch your beautiful orchids die, despite your best attempts. And you will probably give up hope of every cultivating these beautiful orchids.

This happened to me. I live in the Pianura Padana, a plains area in the north of Italy. When I first tried to grow a few Masdevallias, I had no problems during fall, winter and spring, but with the coming of summer I lost all my plants. We have too little moisture in my region from June to the beginning of September, and temperatures can reach, or even exceed, 35°C in a shade house. A few years ago another orchid lover, who lives close to my home, showed me that by growing his plants on the bank of a small river, the problem was resolved. He placed his plants in a shady spot very close to the river edge; the evaporating water increased humidity and kept the temperature lower. Well, you are probably thinking, "but only very few people have a river nearby". Correct! What I am suggesting is that you create a small 'river' in your own growing area. Inspired by what I saw (and in particular by the very good results that my friend had with his plants), I decided to try simulating his growing conditions. The apparatus I made is very simple and can be moved from one place to another, for instance, if you want to transfer your plants from the greenhouse to a shade house.

Materials Required

I used the following materials to create the 'river':

- 1. a plastic container 10 cm deep and big enough to contain all my Masdevallias
- 2. a small water pump (like the ones used to circulate water in small aquariums)
- 3. plastic tubing with an internal diameter of about 5 mm
- 4. a bucket with a diameter similar to shorter side of the plastic container

Assembling the 'River'

I put the bucket on the ground directly below the plastic container (see Figure 1). Then I placed the plastic container sloping slightly in the direction of the bucket, and made some holes in the final part placed above the bucket. I put the water pump into the bucket, connected one end of the tubing to the pump and I placed the other end in the part of the plastic container opposite the bucket. The outlet of the tubing was placed at the bottom of the container, generating a flowing film across the bottom of the container. Then I placed all my masdevallias into the container and in a shady location.





Beware the Pond I Approach

Some may object: "I can simply put the plants in the container with some water in the bottom." But the situation you would obtain is different; you are creating a 'pond' instead of a 'river'. Simply filling the container with water would cause these problems: * Stagnant conditions, with a high risk of fungal disease. With the 'river' apparatus described above, water is always circulating. Add a few drops of a good fungicide to this circulating water and any problem of fungal disease is normally eliminated.

* You must use a relatively large quantity of water, otherwise the 'pond' in the container may run dry after a short time (this can ruin the pump).

* The plants would have their 'feet in water'. While this may be good for Phragmipediums, we all know that in general orchids, including Masdevallias, do not like constantly wet feet. A thin film of water flowing below the pot, however, is something different. The plants will absorb some water by capillary action in an environment that is constantly moist, but not wet.

Variations on the I River'

Some possible improvements or variations to this 'river' system are:

*Add expanded clay to the bottom of the container and put the plants on top of it. This will limit direct contact with water. I haven't tried this, but a friend of mine did, with successful results similar to mine. * Use a very, very weak solution of fertilizer instead of plain water. This practice must be done very carefully because as the water evaporates, the residual solution will become more concentrated. A good way to avoid salt buildup is to fill the bucket with the nutrient solution once a week and replace the evaporated water with pure water only. At the beginning of each week, change the entire solution, so you start the week fresh. In addition, once a month I fill the bucket with distilled water and us only that for one week to eliminate salt buildup problems.

* Add a fan directed toward the container. I suggest directing it with an angle between 30 and 60 degrees with respect to the plane of the container. This will act like a miniature evaporative cooler and keep the atmosphere fresh and buoyant. Using a fan will speed up evaporation, however, so make sure there is plenty of water in your bucket.

Benefits of a Dynamic System

When we speak or read about the relationship between orchids and water, we always come

across the statement: "keep your plants moist, but not wet" (I say this above, too), But what is the real difference between the 'pond' and 'river' approaches to orchid culture? In my opinion, it is that one system is static, and the other is dynamic. If your plants are constantly wet and sitting in a 'pond', they are experiencing a static (stagnant) situation. Evaporation is very slow via a small surface area, facilitating fungal and bacterial disease, and air movement is poor. Exchanges of water and air between pot, substrate, plant and the ambient environment are too slow. However, if your plants are growing near a 'river', the total moisture in the overall system may be the same (in fact, it may be more) than the pond approach, but because of good air movement and quick evaporation of the water, exchanges between all the parts of the system are correct for the healthy developments of your plants. During the growing season, try leaving your Masdevallias out in the rain (that is *'en plein air'* with the natural air circulation). Those plants will grow healthy. Give these plants less water when growing them inside your greenhouse, otherwise the environment will become too stagnant.

I hope my experience will help orchid enthusiasts in places with hot summers all over the world to increase their success with Masdevallias.
